
Message from the Vice Provost

"Asian American Voter Access in LA County: In-language Ballot Use, Voter Experiences and Effectiveness of Voter Outreach"

A new AASC policy initiative report, "Asian American Voter Access in Los Angeles County," co-authored by Professor Natalie Masuoka (UCLA), Professor Nathan Chan (Loyola Marymount University), and Executive Director Nancy Yap (Center for Asian Americans United for Self Empowerment) was released at the CAUSE pre-event Summer Soiree. The study offers insights into what the experience of casting a ballot is like for Asian Americans in Los Angeles County and the extent to which they find voting services useful.


