

Curator's Choice: Project 1521 and the Florentine Codex

The approaching quincentennial of the conquest of Mexico offers many lessons for us today. A vital document of that cataclysmic era is **The General History of the Things of New Spain**—aka the **Florentine Codex**—a massive, 2,000page guide to 16th century central Mexico. Created by Nahua scholars and artists under the direction of a Spanish Franciscan friar and in the wake of the Spanish invasion, it was completed during a devastating epidemic caused by the viruses introduced to the region by the conquistadors.
